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#### ВСТУП

Згідно з Положенням «Про організацію навчального процесу у закладах самостійна робота здобувачів вищої освіти», вищої освіти (бакалаврського) рівня є основним засобом оволодіння навчальним матеріалом у час, вільний від обов'язкових навчальних завдань. Реформа вищої освіти в Україні пов'язана за своєю суттю з переходом від парадигми навчання до парадигми освіти. У цьому плані слід визнати, що самостійна робота здобувачів вищої освіти є не просто важливою формою освітнього процесу, а повинна стати його основою. Мова йде не просто про збільшення кількості годин на самостійну роботу, а про принциповий перегляд організації навчального процесу у закладі вищої освіти, який повинен будуватися так, щоб розвивати вміння вчитися, формувати у здобувачів здібності до саморозвитку, творчого застосування отриманих знань, способів адаптації до професійної діяльності у сучасному світі. Шлях, який сьогодні обраний у ЗВО України, це зменшення числа аудиторних занять на користь самостійної роботи.

Завданнями самостійної роботи здобувачів вищої освіти можуть бути засвоєння певних знань, умінь, навичок, закріплення та систематизація набутих знань, їхнє застосування під час вирішення практичних завдань та виконання творчих робіт, виявлення прогалин у системі знань із предмета.

Формування навичок та вмінь володіння англійською мовою професійного спрямування  $\epsilon$  основним компонентом підготовки майбутніх авіаційних фахівців, і тому, її вільне застосування  $\epsilon$  важливим компонентом забезпечення безпеки й надійності повітряного руху, відповідно, особлива увага приділяється самостійній роботі під час підготовки майбутніх диспетчерів управління повітряним рухом.

Самостійна робота здобувачів вищої освіти спрямована не на засвоєння фразеології радіообміну, а передбачає оволодіння темами, що стосуються загальної англійської та англійської мови професійного спрямування, які є необхідними для спілкування між пілотами й диспетчерами. Основним спрямуванням самостійної роботи є засвоєння мови, що потрібна для спілкування у звичайних та аварійних ситуаціях.

Особливості самостійної роботи майбутніх диспетчерів управління повітряним рухом зумовлені метою і завданнями викладання навчальної дисципліни «Англійська мова професійного спрямування».
